Rabies Numbers in Canada for 2021

In 2021, there were 2,443 samples submitted in 2021 for rabies testing from across Canada. Nationally, 105 samples tested positive. Ontario accounted for 1,325 samples of which 42 tested positive. The breakdown from which species the positive samples were taken are as follows:

To the end of February, there was just one positive rabies case reported in Ontario in a dog.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Found in Ontario

As of April 6, 2022, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has confirmed the presence of HPAI, subtype H5N1, in the following 10 areas in Ontario:

- April 6, 2022 – City of Markham, Ontario (poultry flock)
- April 6, 2022 – Municipality of Chatham-Kent, Ontario (poultry flock)
- April 5, 2022 – Prince Edward County, Ontario (backyard flock)
- April 5, 2022 – City of Markham, Ontario (poultry flock)
- April 4, 2022 – Township of Centre Wellington, Ontario (poultry flock)
- April 2, 2022 – Township of Selwyn, Ontario (backyard flock)
- March 31, 2022 – Township of Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation (backyard flock)
- March 30, 2022 – Township of Woolwich (poultry flock)
- March 28, 2022 – Township of Zorra (poultry flock)
- March 27, 2022 – Township of Guelph/Eramosa (poultry flock)

Three sites have also been confirmed in Alberta:

- April 6, 2022 – Mountain View County, Alberta (poultry flock)
- April 6, 2022 – Mountain View County, Alberta (poultry flock)
- April 6, 2022 – Ponoka County (poultry flock)

Nova Scotia and Newfoundland and Labrador also have ongoing or concluded Avian influenza sites although no new detections since March.

Emergency Transit of Regulated Animals

The CFIA and USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service officially agreed to implement an Emergency Transit Policy for Regulated Animals. The policy makes it easier and faster to evacuate regulated animals, such as livestock, birds, pets, and companion animals, across the border during emergencies such as flooding, forest fires, extreme weather conditions or disasters, or when routine transportation routes are impaired without feasible alternatives. Animals transiting through the other country during an emergency will be instructed when and where they will have to re-enter their country of origin.

Under the joint policy, the country declaring an emergency will inspect animals, apply official seals to transport conveyances, and issue a simplified export health certificate either at the port(s) of exit by an official veterinarian or at the premises of origin by an accredited veterinarian or official veterinarian. Blastomycosis

Constance Lake First Nation, a community of over 900 residents, declared a state of emergency in November after probable cases of blastomycosis and three deaths came to light.

Blastomycosis is typically caused by a fungus that grows in moist soil, leaves and rotting wood. Symptoms can range from a mild cough that does not go away to serious breathing problems. Some people may not show any symptoms, while
